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


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MEETINGS IN YORKTON

Dementia Friendly Gallery Reception & Project Launch:

Belong Where You Find Yourself

On November 14, the Godfrey Dean Art Gallery (GDAG) launched a new multi-year participatory art-making project called *Belong Where You Find Yourself*, which invites people living with dementia and their care partners from Yorkton, Melville, and surrounding rural areas to become artist-participants and share their stories. Throughout the next year, twelve artist-participants will collaborate with two

professional artists. The collective works will be presented as a three month visual art exhibition at the gallery and will be toured to local small towns in 2023. The Dementia Friendly Gallery Reception was coordinated by the Godfrey Dean Art Gallery and the Alzheimer Society of Saskatchewan (ASOS) as part of the Collective Impact project, Dementia Supports in Rural Saskatchewan. Attendees of the Dementia Friendly reception also had the opportunity to learn about supports and services offered by the Alzheimer Society in the area.


Dementia Friendly Life Enrichment Program



Dementia Friendly Life Enrichment Facilitator at SaskAbilities



SUCCESS STORIES - Dementia Supports in Rural Saskatchewan

I. Impacts at the Individual Level

- Service delivery to 18 persons living with dementia and their care partners through SaskAbilities Dementia Friendly Life Enrichment program
- Life Enrichment program facilitators acting as referrals agents for care partners supporting them to navigate the complex and fragmented systems of care
- Trust built between Life Enrichment program facilitators and persons living with dementia and their care partners
- Satisfaction of persons living with dementia and their care partners with the services provided by the Life Enrichment program
- Building connections among people with lived experience in the region to support each other and share resources
- Care partners realizing the importance of self-care

II. Impacts at the Organizational, Institutional & Systems Level

- Referrals between collaborating organizations
 (Saskabilities, Alzheimer Society, Art Gallery) and other
 community organizations (e.g. health care, home care)
- Community organizations expressing interest in the project (e.g. libraries in Canora and Esterhazy, pharmacy in Esterhazy)
- Institutionalizing data collection and reporting by collaborating organizations (using the Alzheimer Society's database to enable more systematic data collection and reporting)
- Building capacity at collaborating organizations to implement best practices (hiring a communication expert by Alzheimer Society to implement the awareness campaign; hiring two artists by Art Gallery to meaningfully engage persons with lived experience)
- Institutionalization of collaborating organizations' programs (Alzheimer Society becoming a formal referral partner of SaskAbilities)
- Building a culture of mutual support among collaborating organizations (e.g. attending each other's events and contributing to each other's programs and activities) and other community organizations (SIGN offering office space to Alzheimer Society and SaskAbilities staff)

III. Impacts at the Community & Societal Level

A) Enhancing public awareness about dementia through:

- Sending mass ad-mails (Alzheimer Society), local newspaper ads, rack cards, and posters (Saskabilities and Alzheimer Society), blogs (Alzheimer Society)
- Hosting virtual ABC's of Dementia presentations within the former Sunrise Health Region
- In-person presentation of the projects (Life Enrichment program presenting to 30 people at a senior drop-in center in Canora)
- Touring across 13 communities in the region (Alzheimer Society)
- Building and expanding networks across community organizations and tapping into different community assets (e.g. reaching out to seniors drop-in centers, home care services, health system, libraries, and pharmacies)
- Mobilizing resources across community organizations (referrals made between collaborating organizations and other community organizations)

B) Reaching out to several communities in the region:

- Alzheimer Society summer community tour in 13 communities: Bredenbury, Canora, Churchbridge, Esterhazy, Kamsack, Langenberg, Melville, Norquay, Preeceville, Pelly, Saltcoats, Stenen, Sturgis, Yorkton
- SaskAbilities program reaching clients in 5 communities: Canora, Esterhazy, Melville, Theodore, Yorkton
- C) Conducting needs assessment to determine community needs, areas of priority, and finding gaps in the services and supports (by Parkland Valley)

IV. Impacts at the Policy Level

- Project being presented and promoted at local legislative and policy making bodies (Melville City Council)
- Planning to use the audit program findings and recommendations in the City of Yorkton Capital Planning budget cycle for 2022
- Engagement of City of Yorkton's Mayor in the Community Table
